RI President Ray Klinginsmith visited the Jackson Hole are August 2-4, 2010. President Ray indicated several years ago that he wanted to visit the Jackson/Yellowstone area of Wyoming and though his calen-

dar is extremely busy, he worked with PDG's Bill and Nancy Pettus to schedule a visit to the area. On the night of his arrival a dessert reception was held at the Pettus home and President Ray was able to interact with a variety of invited guests including area club Presidents and Presidents Elect, Interact students and others.

attended by approximately 200 Rotarians. Though President Ray mentioned the importance of interna-

tional projects, as President of Rotary International he is focusing on local clubs during his term. "The life and breath of Rotary are the clubs." It is through the clubs that all that Rotary does is accomplished.

President Ray stressed the importance of the long time campaign to eradicate polio. He gave specific examples of polio eradication in the Philippines in the late 1970's which led Rotary leadership to believe that polio could be eradicated worldwide. He mentioned that when the large scale campaign began in the late 1980's some 350,000 people annually were inflicted with the terrible disease. Recent reports have

the worldwide figure of new cases at below 2,000. "Our goal is now 99.9 percent achieved with only four endemic countries remaining." He said the recent upsurge in Tajikistan was a result of the virus being carried into the country from India and officials in the country failing to do follow up immunizations after they were declared polio free. This issue is being addressed and Tajikistan officials are working hard to stamp out the outbreak. He ended his talk stating, "The world is

full of great need and Rotary is filling that need."

upon his powerful upper body strength to maximize distance and speed. He visited India in 2002 and witnessed the devastating reality for polio victims who do not have rehabilitative supports. Upon his return to Canada, Ramesh vowed to help. Cycle to Walk was born.

The Johns-town Milliken Rotary Club, with less than 40 members, is making a big impact on their local com-

munities through the promotion of literacy for early childhood education and K-12. The members participate in a Bedtime Reading Program at the Milliken Police Department that includes uniformed Police Officers and Firemen, children and parents participating in an

evening of reading and cookies and milk. Current President, Colleen Flack says "I'm particularly pleased about this program as it brings young children and their parents into a very welcoming atmosphere which promotes reading and an added comfort level to the police department and local emergency personnel."

The club conducts several fundraisers and events throughout the year in an effort support their literacy effort, including partnering with Barnes and Noble Bookstore for book drives during

Mother's Day and Father's Day and gift wrapping during holidays. The club also raises funds through book sales during BBQ Days in Johnstown and Beef and Bean Days in Milliken. The funds raised help support the Bedtime Reading Program, a Third Grade Dictionary Program and a Student of the Month Program at Roosevelt High School that honors nine students throughout the year. Recently, the club was able to donate books to an Indian Reservation where children have little access to books.

The High Plains Eaton Rotary Club has been very active this summer with co-presidents Katie Turner and Judy Tormey at the helm. The club has less than 40 members but manages to support numerous projects including Meals on Wheels, Adopt-A-Soldier and a local Literacy Program.

Traveling almost 90 miles roundtrip, members of the High Plains Eaton Club pick up prepared meals from Meals on Wheels in Greeley and deliver them to local shut-in residents in the Eaton, Ault, Nunn and Pierce, CO. Members sign up to deliver the meals 5 days a week. One club member says "it's a long trip, but it is worth it to see the smiles on faces as hot meals are delivered."

In June, the club raised money though "Happy Dollars" and sent their first box of goodies to an American Soldier stationed in Afghanistan. They hope to send a box a month throughout the year.

To help promote their Literacy Program, guest speakers are honored





Promoting Membership

One effective way to attract new members is through publicity on your existing members. Remember that Rotary was created to provide opportunities for business and community service networking. Personalizing the values and mission of Rotary through your individual members sends a clear message to the community that people they know and respect are involved in your club. Here are some of the ways your own Club's PR Committee can help:

•Recognize new members through a news release or paid advertisement. Include a picture (head shot or member induction photo) and some background information on the member (i.e., business affiliation, community service activities, family, etc.).

Note: Your District PR Committee is working on a print advertising "template" that can be localized for insertion into your community newspaper. Your club will be responsible for paying the non-profit advertising rate.

- •Publicize the presentation of a "Vintage Classification" talk by a long-standing member.
- -Issue a press release to the local media (print, radio, TV, cable) after the presentation with salient information about the member (i.e., business affiliation, community service, family, Rotary years of service and involvement, etc.)
- -Invite a reporter to cover the presenta-

tion

- -With the member's permission, provide the media with a contact number they can use to interview the member (especially effective with radio and cable outlets).
- •Publicize the selection of new officers and/or key committee chairs with a news release. Provide photos!

So I responded Just look out the window and when they leave the house, it's time to go!

And when he went camping and white water kayaking this past weekend with the youth kayaking coach, I felt like a mother sending her child off to the wildrerness! *Of course he'll be ok; he's a grown teenager!* He had a marvelous time on the Grey's River near Alpine.

October is when it all happens for the next school year – the planning, the commitment, and the paperwork. Teton Valley will send its



first outbound student this next school year (we've sponsored students from other areas prior to this year). The experience is well worth it so if your club hasn't participated in the youth exchange, or if you've not participated for a number of years, perhaps this is the year to start. What better way to bring better world understanding into your community and help a young person have the experience of his/her life.
